






What is the University of Divinity?







The University Badge



- Represents the UD's Vision, Mission, and collegiate identity
- The Badge is a star both a biblical symbol and an Australian symbol – formed by a constellation of open books
- The books represent wisdom and are open to critical interpretation. The gathering of these many parts into a whole expresses the collegiate shape of the University
- The gold represents excellence. The distinctive accent is red, representing passion and sacrifice which facilitate and flow from the study of divinity
- The constellation of books creates two stars, one on the outside and one on the inside, illustrating the University's commitment to tradition and innovation
- Through critical study, the University brings ancient truths into dialogue with the issues of the contemporary world

Student Support Plan to help you complete your assessments when you experience serious interruptions



- <u>Lecturer's extension</u>: up to 2 weeks
- Academic Dean's extension: up to 4 weeks
- First point of contact is your lecturer



- Students may apply for special considerations via a <u>Student Support</u>
 <u>Plan</u> when their studies are interrupted by unforeseeable circumstances, e.g., illness, hardship, trauma, bereavement, etc
- We also provide special grading consideration
- Additional time to complete assessment tasks
- Changed circumstances for assessments
- Changed type of assessments
- Extensions beyond the 4 weeks

Leave of Absence

- A student undertaking an award of the University, may apply for a maximum of one year (2 semesters) leave of absence from the course they are studying
- An <u>application form</u> to take leave of absence must be submitted prior to the start on the subsequent semester
 - The <u>completed form</u> must be submitted to the <u>registrar</u> and approved by the University

Guidelines for use of generative AI tools

Appropriate uses of Al





Simplify complex topics for research.

Brainstorm ideas.



Translate text into a variety of languages.



Look for resources and ideas around a topic.



Enhance your grammar, language expression or write in plain English (using your own original writing)

Inappropriate uses of Al

- Creating prompts that ask to write, draw or create whole or parts of assessment material, and copying it into assessment submissions as your own work.
- Solving tasks in examination questions and copying it into assessment submissions as your own work.
- Asking for original ideas to answer essay topics and copying the text verbatim into assessment submissions.
- Asking for a full paraphrasing of part of a peer reviewed published resource and copying it into assessment submissions as your own work.
- Looking up specialised knowledge and claiming the search results as your own work in assessment submissions.



Acknowledgement of one's own work and use of Al in Assessment Tasks




- All students are required to complete a form to acknowledge and outline the use of AI in preparing or finalising assignments. Students will need to ensure that AI is appropriately cited and included in their reference list
- All students are required to verify that the work is their own, has not been submitted otherwise for credit and acknowledges the work of others

Educational IT Systems

Staff and students of the University use a number of systems in their learning, teaching and research:

- ARK = the Learning Management System, used to support all units at the University
- <u>Library Hub</u> = digital library resources including databases, journals and e-books
- <u>Paradigm</u> = the Student Information Management System, providing access to enrolment data and results.
- Research Repository = a comprehensive database with records of publications by members of the University
- <u>Unit Directory</u> = the Unit Management System allows students and staff to view the diverse range of units available across the University and its Colleges.
- <u>Vox</u> = a digital hub for connecting relevant news and events with students, staff and the wider University of Divinity community.















ARK






Turnitin submissions
